#### **Turtles Struggling with New Liability Insurance Requirement**

About a month ago the Turtles and Doves were notified that they would be required to secure group liability insurance by October 1 of this year if they expect to retain their charter. Our Association was just made aware of the requirement and has just started to look into it. Information is a bit sketchy but it appears that all local Greek organizations will need to secure insurance or sign into a group policy brokered by Carthage. It doesn't apply to Nationals as they carry liability insurance. We're checking if it also applies to all other Carthage groups. While it's a group policy the premium would be spread out over all individuals effected, regardless of group size. Current estimates are \$125-\$150 per member. The roll out of this new policy was very poorly handled, in my view, and certainly the Turtle and Dove Presidents are very confused and rightfully concerned that this could drive membership away from many valuable organizations.

Join us in contacting President Swallow, members of the Carthage Board of Trustees and of course other alums, in asking that the College put the brakes on. Our hope is that this new policy would be put on hold until next fall to allow time for Carthage to meet with campus student leaders to sift through the what and why of their decision. Consequently this provides time for those leaders to go back to their organizations and plan their future with a potentially large financial obligation. This will be a good indicator on how much Carthage really values all that Greeks do as Actives and Alumni.

# Loud, loyal 'Preps' had the run of the place

For most incoming students, the college experience starts when they set foot on campus as freshmen. Early in the College's history, however, the Carthage College Academy provided younger students with a taste of college life.

Founded in 1870, the Academy opened on the new campus in Carthage, Illinois. Initially designed strictly as a gateway to the College, it featured a two-year course of study divided into Preparatory and Sub-Freshman classes.

Its popularity soon warranted a third, and, as the 20th century dawned President Frederick L. Sigmund announced the Academy would become a full fouryear program. In 1908, it earned accreditation from the University of Illinois, becoming the first accredited private academy in the state.

The Academy's goals expanded along with its size. Its dual purpose is described in the 1924 Crimson Rambler yearbook: to provide preparation "sufficient in quality and quantity to admit a student to any college or university" and to give those unable to attend college "as much training and culture as is possible in four years of secondary school work."

Besides the surrounding communities, the Academy drew students from larger cities like Kansas City, St. Louis, Chicago, and Milwaukee. Like the College, the preparatory school was co-ed; 10 of the 12 members of its freshman class in 1922- newspaper, and sports program, although many 23 were women.

Students had access to the Carthage's faculty and facilities, resources that certainly weren't available to their counterparts in standard secondary schools. Those who passed through the Academy also maintained a strong alumni association.

The "Preps," as upperclassmen nicknamed them, gained a reputation for frequent social outings. While the collegians viewed the younger campus dwellers as a loud and rambunctious lot,

the Preps pleaded guilty only to having a healthy supply of "pep." Academy students' loyalty and school spirit were unquestioned, as they cheered from the sidelines at sporting events.

They started their own literary society, were called up to compete alongside the collegians in debate and athletics. Some varsity teams were primarily stocked with Preps.

Harold H. Lentz described the College's reliance on the preparatory program. He wrote that "there were many years when the total enrollment was either kept respectable or made economically feasable [sic] only because of a large enrollment in the Academy."

By 1927, however, Academy enrollment dwindled to single digits as demand for such programs waned nationwide. Facing high overhead costs, officials chose to discontinue it.

While the Preps never made it to the Kenosha campus, vestiges of preparatory education remain. Between 8 and 12 high school students take classes at Carthage each term through Wisconsin's Early College Credit Program, chipping away at credit In "The Miracle of Carthage," longtime president requirements for high school, college, or both.

The benefits listed on the program's website an edge in the college application process, use of campus resources like the Hedberg Library, and "a taste of the college life" — practically match the ones Academy principal Emily Pennock touted in 1924

## **TEXAA Association Update**

With the 65<sup>th</sup> in the rear view mirror the board can refocus plans on building the Alumni Association. One of our major pushes in the upcoming year is working on getting complete lists of all former Turtle and Dove Presidents. Our hope is to contact those Presidents and find points of contact for each year or several so we can get better connected. Our guess is a number of the notes go into a spam or trash folder and never get seen. Of course you can help out by letting us know if you change your address and don't hesitate to send us the names and emails of those brothers and sisters you communicate with.

We continue to stay connected with Actives and attend 2-4 meetings a year to see how things are going. In our meeting last fall the mood regarding Greeks on campus had definitely improved and the Turtles had signed off on new Residence Life rules as they relate to Greeks. Fortunately for the Actives they are the largest and best organized group so compliance should not be a problem. Do check out their article in this newsletter as well as John Felton's as he's serving on the Presidents Alumni Council on Greek Life. Finally it's important to note that we're working with a few of the Actives who are work studies in the Carthage alumni office to cross check our membership records with theirs. In the future we hope to utilize their mailing services for key events and fundraising activities that benefit both the College and the Turtles.

It's hard to believe that we've reached our 4<sup>th</sup> year of non-profit status as a tax deductible organization. If you saw the Treasurer's report we're starting to get some funds built up, especially in the Founding Father Fund, and now need to get plans in place on how best to manage it. We will continue to support the Actives by purchasing the composite picture that hangs in the Turtle dorm hallway, assist in fundraising for the MDA and should they continue with their summer SPARK program, help support the young women looking at STEM careers.

Finally I'm bummed to report that Chris Steenrod will be stepping down from the Exec Board this fall after a number of years. As his career and family kicks into high gear he's running out of time in the day. Special thanks go out to him for his help in getting our Constitution correctly written and in establishing our online Turtle apparel program utilizing CustomInk and Booster. Both of those will continue to be a big help to us in the future. This is also a good time to solicit help from any Turtles or Doves who are interested in advancing the Turtles. The organization meant so much for many of us while we attended Carthage and this is a way to make sure that opportunity exists for those now attending the College.
